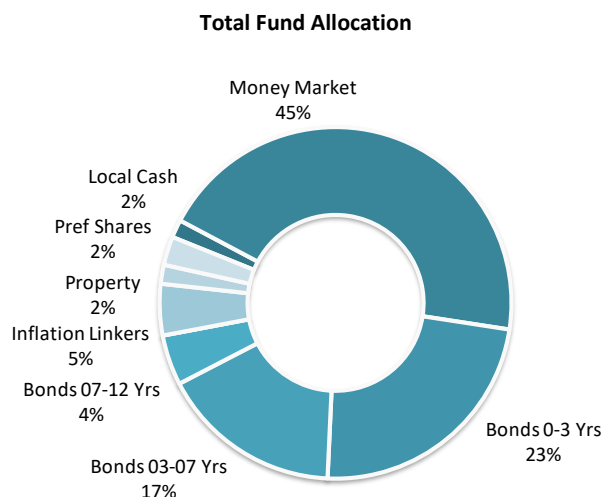

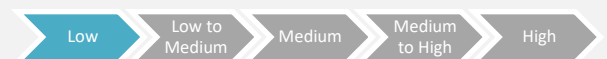

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COMMENTARY

Prescient

Over the last quarter financial markets continued to be gripped by a high degree of uncertainty. This stemmed from a number of diverse factors including the Trade Wars, Brexit, negative developed market bond yields and slowing global growth. This caused a risk off reaction globally with Emerging Market currencies trading weaker. Locally, South Africa has felt the brunt of this uncertainty as foreigners continued to sell our bonds. They are now net sellers of our bonds for the year. The local landscape unfortunately, has also continued to deteriorate with a worsening fiscal position, Eskom woes and very little policy certainty. The MPC cut rates during July as subdued inflation and a dovish Fed gave them a small window of opportunity. With the ZAR continuing to weaken and inflation forecast to be heading higher, the window for more rate cuts seems to be closing. With front end rates fairly anchored and pressure on longer dated bonds from issuance and foreign selling the curve continues to steepen. We are of the view that a lot of risks abound and that our cautious stance is warranted. The Fund continues to earn an attractive real yield and we remain focussed on maintaining this. The Fund outperformed its benchmark over the quarter and last 12 months. Managing the duration in the fund, locking in higher rates when rates moved up, added to performance. Outperformance also came from the inclusion of good quality credit, which generated yield over and above the benchmark. With the credit market tightening further, we are focussing on high quality credit and shorter dated credit where the impact of a spread event will be minimal, and liquidity is most attractive. We believe this is prudent as current spreads do not justify the risk one is taking.

Granate Asset Management

Uncertainty around global economic growth momentum caused markets to be jittery especially as investors digested the potential economic implications of an inverted US yield curve, in addition to the on-going trade tensions surrounding US and China. Most Emerging markets were affected causing asset class returns excluding bonds, to be weak, with foreign outflows increasing pace considerably more than last quarter and causing the USD/ZAR to end the quarter at 15.20. The ZAR was also weaker against most major currencies. Inflation Linked Bonds as well as equities continue to underperform with Listed Property being the worst performing asset class over the quarter and the year. Global bond yields have fallen dramatically, and the US 10-year bond yield is now at 1.5% which fell 52bps over the month of August. European and German yields have also fallen as ECB policy accommodation becomes a real possibility. Inflation continues to be benign with the most recent July number surprising to the downside when it came in at 4% year on year, against expectations of 4.2%.

The Income Fund is defensively positioned and continues to generate most of its performance from floating rate corporate bonds, although is currently benefitting from the strong performance in government fixed rate bonds. SA bonds are looking extremely cheap against global yields and such we increased duration in the fund over the quarter. Listed property remains an extremely low weighting in the fund. The Income Fund is defensively positioned but is still benefitting from the strong performance in bonds. Although credit spreads are looking expensive, the fund continues to earn an enhanced yield above cash as its main objective, whilst property exposure remains low due to the volatility of the sector and poor growth outlook.
